Types of Cotton Used in Bed Sheets

Organic cotton: This is organic cotton, grown free of synthetic pesticides and fertilizers. Organic cotton sheets are soft and breathable and contain no chemical content. It is ideal for sensitive skin or allergies.

Thread count: Does it matter?

Thread count is the number of threads that are woven into one square inch of the fabric. For a large number of buyers, a higher thread count typically comes with higher quality, although this is not always the case. A higher thread count can give a sheet softer and longer-lasting feel, but many things aside from thread count determine the softness and durability of a sheet.

Cotton bed sheets have an ideal thread count of about 200 to 400. If it's above 400, the feel becomes softer, but the sheets are then rather hot. A low thread count brings in a more affordable price range, but they are not as luxurious nor as durable.

Weaves: Percale vs. Sateen

The type of weave present in a <u>double bed sheet cotton</u>, really affect the texture and feel to a great extent and even its durability. Two common weaves for cotton bed sheets are percale and sateen.

Percale Weave: A simple, one-over-one-under weave that produces crisp, cool, and airy fabric. It provides a matte finish to the sheets. This type of sheet is normally favored by people who sleep hot. They are pretty light and airy and much preferred in summers or warm climatic conditions.

Sateen Weave: Sateen is a more complex weave, where more strands pass over the warp strands thus making a softer, silkier fabric. Sateen sheets finish with an excellent lustre and feel much more luxurious than percale sheets. However, they breathe poorly, making them only more suitable for colder climates or winter seasons.

Sizes and Fit for Double Bed Sheets

A double size bed sheet is also known as a full-size bed sheet. It is intended for use with the mattress that ranges in width by 54 inches and is length by 75 inches. You must ensure that the cotton sheet of your double bed fits well with the mattress. Here are several things to consider when you are searching for a double bed sheet:

Fitted Sheets: Fitted sheets have elastic edges that are wrapped over the mattress to keep the sheet in place. If you buy fitted sheets be sure to first check which depth your mattress is. Although a standard mattress is usually about 7-9 inches deep, the deeper pockets usually work better with mattresses or toppers.

It consists of flat sheets: these are rectangular shapes of fabrics that can be placed atop the fitted sheet and underneath the blanket or duvet. The dimensions of a flat sheet are mostly bigger than that of the size of the mattress, so it will fit properly at the sides of the mattress when tucked in.

Pillowcases: Most cotton bed sheet sets come with pillowcases. Expect pillowcases to be either standard or king-size since some double bed sheet sets are only available in one of these sizes.

Care for Cotton Bed Sheets

If you want your cotton bed sheets to stay soft, just as they were on the very first day after having bought them, if you want them to last for as long a time as possible, and to look the way they looked from day one, you have to take care of them correctly. Here's how to do it:

Washing: Always check the label before washing your sheets. Cotton sheets can normally be washed in the machine, either in cold or warm water. Avoid using hot water, which can shrink the fibers.

Drying: Tumble dry on low heat so that the fabric does not shrink. Take out the sheets as soon as possible from the dryer to avoid wrinkles. You can alternatively line-dry these sheets if you want a more eco-friendly option.

Ironing: If someone likes their sheet to be smooth and wrinkle-free, then cotton sheets can iron over low to medium heat. Most people like the fluff of fresh-dried cotton sheets that are not completly ironed.

Storage: Store your double bed sheet cotton in a cool dry place. Avoid placing them directly under sunlight as its exposure will fade the color of the fabric eventually.
